We are saddened to report the recent passing of two of our former Township Trustees, Cliff Henry and Ray Gruber. Cliff was a Trustee for over 25 years and was very active in the community. He was on the Harpersfield Volunteer Fire Department for over 50 years. He took care of the financial bookkeeping for all the fundraising events, including the Beef Roast and Fish Fries. In addition, he gave his time and expertise to numerous boards and organizations, including the Geneva Area Chamber of Commerce, where he served as both Chairman and Vice Chairman. Ray also proudly served many years as a Township Trustee. He served as a board member for The Ashtabula County Port Authority and on the Northwest Ambulance Board. He also served as Chairman for The Geneva Senior Center for 20 years. We will all miss the articles he wrote on the history of Harpersfield in the newsletters. Both men served as role models in our community, both in their dedication to our Township and their faith in God. Their legacy is one of service, integrity, and selflessness. They will be greatly missed, but the lasting impact of their work will continue to benefit the community for years to come.

CORK

Cork Cemetery is in a beautiful country setting. It's small but mighty inhabitants were families of early settlers to our area. Many of the stones are gone, but it doesn't diminish the importance of their lives. So where is this mighty location? Cork Cold Springs Road in Harpersfield. A small plot of land with trees and bursts



of sunshine on souls. It's simple not to notice, to just drive by and ignore the quaint green sign. The local history archives are found in the genealogy department of the Ashtabula County Library. The Cork land was first owned by Abraham Scott. There was a Scott family who settled in Painesville in 1806. There was also an Abraham Park Scott who lived in Jefferson County, Ohio and was the head of his household in 1820. The cemetery land was situated on a section of South Harpersfield Methodist Church. The church still stands today.

Gustavus Hamilton Secheverall was born in Montgomery County, New York on December 13, 1796. His father had drowned so he came to Ohio with his mother. They settled in Madison, but eventually bought a farm in Harpersfield. Gustavus was a member of the methodist church and was a freemason. He was very strict in his beliefs. He married Esther Myers in 1817 and who died the first year of their marriage. His second wife was Mary Brakeman and they had eight children. The church started in the home of Gustavus. The minister was John Crawford. The cemetery land was next deeded by R.H. Blanchard to the trustees of the church. It was then that the church was constructed. Records show James Bishop devoting his life in various positions to the church for forty years.

By 1848 the land was sold to the State of Ohio for a cemetery. It's unknown if those interred before that date were already there or if they were reinterred. The records show several souls having passed before 1848. Eleanor Tucker-1845, Eleanor Phelps-1844, Ezra Gregory-1823, and Ora Evans-1845. There is, however, a discrepancy on Ora. The Daughters of the American Revolution have Ora as being buried on County Line Rd in Harpersfield in a field. I wonder if the previous stone only showed Ora's name in memory of him.

Gustavus was buried in Cork Cemetery in 1866 along with other family members. It was said in his obit, "we rejoice that the same God will awaken our brother from his death sleep and give unto him that blessed and complete life that has no second death." It was also stated that the lodge draped a mourning cloth for 30 days.

The cemetery also has several civil war patriots, but the stones are mostly gone. The church itself is said to be "one of the longest continuously operated churches in the western reserve." Who are some of the souls buried in the cemetery? The Adkins family, one of which was Alanah Bartholomew Adkin (1793-1865). She came from Harpersfield, New York and lived nearby a horrific revolutionary war battle in 1780. Daniel Kelsey, whose father Jonas, was in the 3rd regiment under Captain Peleg Ransom in New York, also in the Revolutionary War. Jonas married Sarah Woolsey (1789-1861), whose family was also known to be in the war. Perhaps one of the later souls interred in cork was William Zanzig. There are other names such as Bishop, Blanchard, and Coy. These were all people important to our county. People who we should pause to think about. All of them in a small community cemetery in Cork.

ROAD DEPARTMENT RUMBLES

This summer the Road Crew will be very busy with many projects needing to be completed. The Crew will be doing roadside cutting to keep back the high weeds, while also mowing all the cemeteries, both fire stations, and the Administration building. They also will be replacing 2 road cross pipes and oversize them for better drainage, along with many miles of ditch cleaning. Road chip-and-seal will be starting soon. There will be approximately 10 miles completed this year, using over 1,400 ton of stone. The Township has also scheduled asphalt resurfacing of three roads. These roads are Harper Valley Lane, LaFever Road from Rt. 90 to Rt. 84, and a section of State Road. These resurfacing projects have not been bid out yet.

WATER PROJECT

The South River Road Phase 2 project is now complete, adding city water and fire protection on South River Road from Stolz Road into Lake County. The water service includes Virant's Winery on Adkins Road and Debonne Winery in Lake County. Also within this project – Brant Road and Rt. 534 from State Road to Harpersfield Road. In total, this project added 19 hydrants and over 3 miles of water mains to the Township. The Harpersfield water tower at I-90 has started and will be done this summer, providing much needed water storage for fire protection.

STREET LIGHTING

There are approximately 130 streetlights in the Township. Fixtures are currently a mix of LED, high pressure sodium, and mercury vapor and are typically located at street intersections. Streetlights improve overall safety by providing adequate lighting, which reduces accidents and can be a deterrent to criminal behavior. First Energy maintains the lights and will gradually upgrade all units to a soft white LED fixture. Should a streetlight be out, report the pole location to Ed Pristov at 440-812-6535. Placing a ribbon around the pole will assist in ensuring the correct unit is replaced.

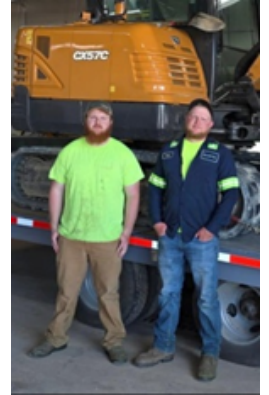
NEW HIRE
